Here are some 2019 highlights from my perspective:

- ❖ Shortly before I began my appointment as your pastor, I was ordained at the Upper New York Annual Conference on June 8. This was a highlight of my ministry thus far and represented a significant bookend in a long process (6 years!) of graduate school, interviews, essay-writing, retreats, and mentorships. I look forward to serving the church as an Elder.
- ❖ It was a blessing to arrive as your pastor being not a complete stranger! My office has been in this building for the

past three years as I served as Schoharie Region Coordinator. As I transitioned into the role as your senior pastor, it was wonderful to get to know you better at several Meetand-Greet parties hosted around the community.

- ❖ It is an honor to serve alongside Pastor JD who brings enthusiasm and a passion for discipleship to our youth ministry.
- ❖ I am passionate about children's ministry and I was thankful to join with a number of you to rejuvenate that programming here at CUMC. Our Block Party was an experiment to reach out to our neighborhood and it turned out to be great fun as we welcomed many different people to our yard for food, ice cream, a bouncy slide, music and games.
- Our worship services have been enhanced by our many kids who bring "joy" to our Joys and Concerns, preach the Gospel in their own words at Children's Time, take candle lighting very seriously, work diligently on bulletins related to each Sunday's theme, and bring the stories alive through dramas.
- Several new families have joined our congregation and two of those families have taken the step of becoming members. It is wonderful to welcome new faces into our family.
- ❖ I enjoy planning and leading worship series. I began my time with you leading a series called "Summer at the Movies" where my message was connected to a different movie each week. In the fall we grew together with a series called "Living Well" in which we explored the practical ways our faith can affect our every-day health and well-being.
- ❖ My first six months with you was marked by the passing of several incredible saints. In all, I presided over 6 church-related funerals. It was an honor to be brought into these

families at such a vulnerable point and allowed to participate in the celebration of life of such special people.

- As a congregation, we embarked on a Vision 2020 process during the last several months of 2019. During these meetings after church it was fun to dream with you about possibilities for our church. I'm excited about the four areas of focus we have chosen. Read more about that on page 27.
- A couple of extraordinary events in my short time with you include our Catalpa tree being struck by lightning and a deer jumping into (and back out of!) our Conference Room. The conference room is back to normal and we pray our beloved tree will withstand this injury.
- As pastor this year, I have had to adjust to having a multichurch charge for the first time (I also serve as pastor at Warnerville UMC). You have also had to adjust to having your lead pastor be part of a multi-church charge for the first time. This has required flexibility and patience on everyone's part. I see fruitful signs of a renewed cooperation between Cobleskill and Warnerville moving forward.
- ❖ I continue to serve on the Oneonta District Leadership Team, the Upper New York Committee on Camps and Retreats, in the community as a member of the Village Historic District Review Board, and I meet regularly with the Cobleskill Area Clergy and our own Schoharie Mosaic Clergy Group, affectionately called the "Jedi."
- On a personal note, my family is grateful for the way you have welcomed us into this church. These first six months have had several challenges. Having such a supportive church community and trusting in God's companionship through it all has allowed us to see the many blessings around us.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

REPORT

Cobleskill United Methodist Church's finances were a challenge in 2019. We entered the year with a \$7,700 balance forward, yet finished the year with a \$12,445 deficit. Early in 2020 we transferred a \$10,987 credit from Ambit Energy for over charges into our general account eliminating most of our carried over deficit. Unfortunately, the 2019 budget was not balanced from the beginning; the Finance Committee knew we did not have the income to meet our current operating expenses and staffing. However, the vitality and mission of the congregation is so spirited we choose to move forward in faith that we would end the year close to the mark. And it did.

Several pieces came together to help this happen: the members of the congregation have met their individual commitments, and some gave above, the thrift store is contributing monthly, and the Trustees have continued to supplement the annual budget from interest on our investments, \$36,000 yearly. We are

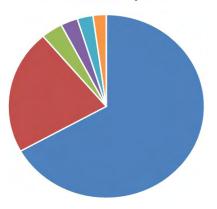
grateful that the generous bequests of the past allow us to supplement our annual budget with investment income and provide the maintenance necessary to care for our buildings.

In 2018-2019 the church experimented with transferring building-related expenses from the main operating budget into a dedicated Trustee account funded by building use money and investment income. After reconsideration of Upper New York guidelines, the Finance Committee and Trustees agreed to return operational expenses back into the general budget for 2020. Several capital-related expenses will remain in a dedicated Trustee budget. Merging our building expenses back into our general budget will allow us to see a more complete picture of our church's financial health.

After paring down our 2020 budget, we are still facing a sizable deficit. We will make adjustments as necessary and trust that God will provide.

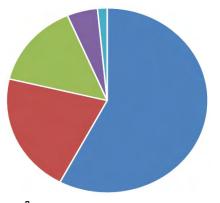

The Trustees are the custodians of our church's assets. They hold these assets in trust for the Upper New York Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church per the Book of Discipline. The church, parsonage, their contents and the adjoining land are the chief concern of the Board of Trustees. We continue to monitor church investments and meet semiannually with our fund managers to maintain proper stewardship of these funds.

The Board of Trustees had a year with several changes and surprises. We changed pastors in the middle of the year and then we lost our faithful member and Treasurer, Margaret Karker. It threw us in a small turmoil to do the work she had been doing for the church and the Trustees, specifically. We have managed these changes with the help of many dedicated members of our board who have stepped up to fill the gap.

One of the highpoints of each year is the awarding of scholarships from the endowments managed by our board. This year the Trustees awarded three scholarships to college students, Nick Elder, Nathalia Mazoff and Emily Lasher.

Our building also hosted the Summer Lunch Program made possible through the Joshua Project. Hosting this ministry didn't cost us anything but we did have our kitchen inspected by the Health Department and the space was readied by volunteers from the congregation.

During this year we have succeeded in doing many improvements for the church building and parsonage. The following projects and expenses were incurred:

- New alarm system installed in the church -\$21,075
- Parsonage sewer system repair \$1280
- Fencing on the parsonage lawn materials, \$820 and labor, \$1100.
- Parsonage upstairs bathroom renovation –materials, \$940, labor was donated by Garrett Cole and Bruce Wright.
- Painting of three rooms in the parsonage- \$700 plus in-kind donation from Mike Quigley.
- Church steam boiler repair-\$529
- Lightning damage to tree and alarm system -\$2166
- Portions of sidewalk replaced -\$2900

SPPRC's 2019 can be described as a year in transition. The fourth such year in a row. It is the second that could be classified as a new beginning year in that same four year block (2016-2019). This year saw the arrival of a new pastoral team (Rev. Anna Blinn Cole and Rev. JD Park) and a new custodian, Katie Joe Dougherty. It also represented the passing of the baton to new co-chairs.

The January through August period of the year was focused specifically on transition. Given the previous pastor's request to leave in early fall 2018 and our 1/4 time additional pastor having visa issues and unable to actively work, our new senior pastor was appointed by mid-Fall, followed by a 1/4 time associate assigned in December 2018. This unusual timing, and nearby location of our new senior pastor meant that there were several meetings held in this period regarding the transition (e.g. condition and preparation of the parsonage). New meetings with the leadership team of Esperance and Gallupville UMC's were also added as we welcomed Pastor JD as part of our 100% appointment team, after his period as a 1/4 time on top of the 100% pastor. During this time the SPPRC learned about sharing costs of

parsonages, for example. February brought the arrival of Katie Joe as custodian; she has been a wonderful addition to the church's staff. Finally, the SPPRC kept the congregation apprised of the changes throughout the January to July period and reinforced the role of our outgoing pastor as our leader.

In July, the co-chairs met with both new pastors in July to discuss how the pastoral duties were going to be handled. This represented new terrain for our SPPRC in that we had not dealt with more that one person representing the 100% full time pastor. Moving into the fall of 2019, work focused on moving solidly into the new era of pastoral and SPPRC leadership. At the August SPPRC meeting, Pastor Anna announced her intention to begin a visioning process for Cobleskill UMC. The SPPRC was fully in support of this process. The SPPRC conducted annual reviews, pastoral salary approvals for 2020, and the pastoral covenants.

The Cobleskill UMC SPPRC is looking forward to a calmer 2020 focused on the support of pastors, staff and congregation through the launch of programs and disciple making opportunities that arose from the Visioning 2020 process.



OUTREACH COMMITTEE

REPORT

Our Outreach Committee, funded by the Road to Jubilee Thrift Store revenues, works to fund Internal, Local, and Global Ministries. At the beginning of 2019 the Committee voted to distribute \$9,175 as follows:

• Internal Ministries: Camp Scholarships \$4,000

o Funding of scholarships enables children to participate in church camps. This year we had 25 children and adults visit or attend either Skye Farm or Casawasco.

Local Ministries:

- o Caring Connections: \$1,500. Rather than have our Church Administrative Assistant and Pastor respond to people asking for monetary and/or other assistance and not be able to accurately assess needs, we refer those in need to Caring Connections.
- o Catholic Charities Domestic Violence \$350;
- o Venison Donation Coalition \$125. We receive donations of venison for our Food Pantry.
- o Office of the Aging \$150. This donation helps to fund Meals on Wheels.
- o Hospice (Helios Care) \$300. We support the efforts of Helios Care to assist patients and families with the complex care required for patients facing significant illness and death.
- o Sunshine Fair Bike Donation: \$100. We assist in the purchase and/or rehabilitation of bicycles for children. Bikes are distributed at the Sunshine Fair.
- Miscellaneous Needs: Halloween funding, \$200; Emergency miscellaneous assistance funds, \$200.
- o Joshua Project: \$200 (see below for further explanation).

Global Ministries

- o Heifer Fund: \$250. The purpose of the Heifer Fund is to assist in ending world hunger. See https://heifer.org
- o UMCOR: \$300. The United Methodist Committee on Relief responds to disasters around the globe.
- Mission Trip Scholarship: \$1500. This year we added this line item to assist members in the congregation in their efforts to participate in mission trips. Mission focused trips can occur locally, regionally, or globally. An application for funds was developed (see church website) for anyone interested in applying for these funds.

Other Outreach Initiatives

- For the first time Cobleskill UMC participated in and hosted a free Summer Lunch program, partnering with the Joshua Project to serve free lunches every day to those in need. Outcomes for this project are as follows:
 - o 1440 meals served at CUMC (as compared to established programs in Middleburgh (2500), Richmondville (2200), and Central Bridge (800). Over the summer a total of 6,618 meals were served to 3,858 children and 2955 adults.
 - o We anticipate participating in the Summer Lunch program in Summer 2020. Based on feedback our church will be responsible for lunches on Mondays (rather than Fridays).

Additional 2019 accomplishments include:

- Financial support for Six Sunday Collections: \$1561.67
- Establishment of Mosaic Regional UMC work
 - o Enables members from various UMC congregations to work for the betterment of all. For example, The Church Has Left the Building Event worked with several churches on needed building and repairing projects.
- Food Pantry
 - o A separate report will summarize the work of our Food Pantry
- Road to Jubilee Thrift Store
 - o This Outreach effort has shown tremendous success in providing gently used clothing, toys, and small household items to those in need.
- Play Group
 - Meets weekly to provide parents of preschool age children to spend time with other parents while their children socialize with other children
- Crop Walk
 - o CUMC hosted and participated in our local Crop Walk.
- Block Party:
 - Pastor Anna organized and hosted a Block Party in September for our neighbors (and anyone who passed by). This was a great success and we have hopes to do another next year.
- Halloween
 - Once again we provided candy and hot and cold drinks to families and children walking by what can be categorized as "Halloween Central" in Cobleskill. All candy was distributed (1255 pieces!) and the adults appreciated the hot drinks as they "trunk or treated" in our space.
- Empty Bowls
 - o We were able to purchase 20 bowls for a minimal cost. Participants paint bowls and then the bowls are sold at a local event to benefit Food Pantries within the county. It assists our Food Pantry in monies to help feed those in need.
- Flood Buckets
 - We purchased and filled approximately 20 flood buckets to support areas that experienced devastating flooding.



FOOD Pantry

It is with heavy hearts the Food Pantry is operating without our leader Margaret Karker after her unexpected passing in August. I would like to thank all of the volunteers who help on Friday and all the people who pick up deliveries, as well as our Administrative Assistant, Cathy Krajewski, for helping with ordering. Since I took over in mid-August we have served 302 household and 991 family members.

The CUMC Food Pantry is a participant in the Feeding America network, the nation's largest domestic hunger-relief organization that works to connect people who are food insecure with the food they need to care for themselves and their families. The network works to get nourishing food from farmers, manufacturers, and retailers to people in need via regional food banks and local pantries. Hunger can affect people from all walks of life. Many Americans are just one job loss or medical crisis away from food insecurity. The Regional Food Bank in Latham, donors, and volunteers all play an important role in our effort to curtail hunger here in Schoharie County.

Food Pantry Contributions

We are blessed to have so many people giving of their time to pick up the food, sort it and stow it away, as well as those who serve the clients who come to our door each Friday. Food and other donations are dropped off at the pantry during the week, usually anonymously; we also have donors who share their excess produce and eggs. During the year we are helped out by Food Drives from mail carriers, Boy/Cub Scouts, SUNY collections, Warnerville United Methodist Church, and the Antique Auto Association; sale of recipe books and recyclable grocery bags at the Hannaford in Esperance. In addition to the caring individuals who give regularly, we received donations from FAM, Beards Hollow Society, Crop-Walk, and Empty Bowls.

THRIFT STORE

Change...nothing is ever constant except change! 2019 was indeed a year for change at The Road to Jubilee Thrift Store...but thankfully it was all good change! We started the year out with our wonderful crew of volunteers who are so incredibly dedicated and thoughtful in their work. For the first half of the year we were again often joined by elder members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Later Day Saints, who helped lift and carry and clean and sort! While the elders have moved on to other duties, we have been blessed by the addition of several new volunteers from the local community whose contributions have become invaluable!

In May, our church as well as 11 other UMCs in the Schoharie Region decided to become a cooperative ministry, committed to supporting each other in growth of our

individual ministries as well as region wide collective ministry. Mosaic was chosen as a name to represent our individual blessings combined together in a beautiful mosaic! With Pastor Anna moving into her role as Senior Pastor at our church, and ending her role as Regional Coordinator, we recognized the need for some part time administrative help for managing the communications and record keeping for Mosaic, and this would require funding.

After some discussion it was decided that a trial run of extending the hours at the thrift store, and having volunteers from the other Mosaic churches help to fill those additional hours could be a way to fund the position as well as possibly provide some extra money to be available for additional Mosaic ministries. We began a trial period of extended hours on Fridays and Saturdays

– adding 2 hours to each day – in September and started to get Mosaic members to take on some shifts each month. It became clear quickly that the extended hours were a great idea, as we started to see new faces as well as an increase in donations. Thus far, we have had Mosaic volunteers from 6 out of the 11 churches, with several churches having more than one volunteer. In the coming year, we will be looking at ways to encourage representation from all 11 Mosaic member churches.

So....what was the outcome of all of our change? In 2019, we once again exceeded our last years income. This year the increase was more than \$4500! We continue to contribute \$7200 per year to our church's general fund, as well as continuing our support of UMCOR, Catholic Charities Domestic Violence Shelter, Heifer Project, Venison Project, The Sunshine Fair bicycle drive, The Joshua Project, Meals on Wheels, and Helios. In addition we added the CRCS Backpack Program and Street Soldiers to our list of community outreach programs we support!

We continue to be so incredibly blessed and thankful for the support of this congregation and our community, and look forward to strengthening our relationship with other Mosaic churches through increased volunteer participation. Here's to another great year for The Road to Jubilee Thrift Store!

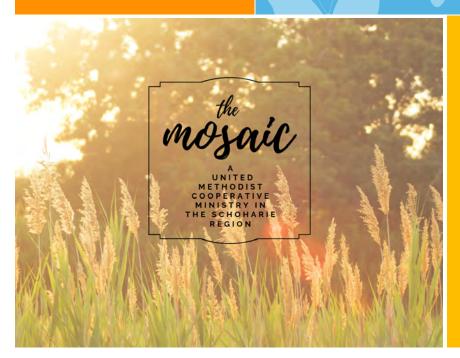
CHURCH HISTORIAN

REPORT

The basic Archival Collection of historic documents, photos, pamphlets, booklets and Annual Reports are now available by request to CUMC members as well as others interested in the history of the church. This collection is stored in a secure location, primarily in loose-leaf binder notebooks, free from environmental damage possibilities. In 2019, photo archives of the Sunday School, the CUMC Choir, and Confirmation classes were added to the collection. For persons who wish to look at specific dates, celebrations or events, a detailed Inventory Guide, available at the Church Office, provides chronological access to the collection. Archival notebooks may not be borrowed or removed from the church facility, but accommodations to provide access can be requested. The Archival Collection began as a way to organize the many boxes of

items that had been saved or donated, and moved around within our facility over many, many years. A wealth of information is provided for those who are interested in the history of our church, dating back to 1854, when the first Cobleskill Methodist Episcopal Church was built on the corner of North Grand Street and an alley that would become Chapel Street. In the future, there are plans to inventory old ledgers and hard cover archives which are fragile, but important additional artifacts. Please feel free to contact me with any questions about church history and the Archival Collection. I would also refer you to the 2015 book, A History of Cobleskill United Methodist Church: 160th Anniversary Celebration, which contains much of the information stored within our archives.
